

Nevada Maintains Coveted Spot In The Top Ten States For Sexual Abuse And Sexual Violence

Maybe it's too much booze, drugs and openness. Maybe it's the continuous commercials which paint Las Vegas as a 'free-wheeling' city. Maybe it's history's backdrop when the mob ruled, organized crime ran the casinos and an "anything goes" attitude took root.

Or maybe it's just a case of perverts being perverts and 'Sin City' being the magnet which draws them.

Regardless of the reason and backstory, Las Vegas sees more than its share of [sexual assault](#) and [sexual abuse cases](#) each year, per capita, than any other city in the nation.

Brothel Owner Runs For Office As A Republican

The GOP, which used to pride itself on being the political party of 'family values,' is now embarrassed. In a state marketed as a place where people can indulge in any number of sins is confronting its status as the only place in America where sex can be legally bought.

The state's most famous pimp is proof.

Dennis Hof, who operates six brothels, challenged incumbent legislator James Oscarson in the primary, and won.

And Hof, owner of the famed Bunny Ranch brothels and scores of strip clubs, won with the help of the state's Bible thumpers.

Culture of Abuse

According to a [survey published in The Las Vegas Sun](#), Nevada ranks among the worst states for sexual violence, sexual abuse and domestic violence.

When most persons think of sexual abuse and violence, they think of a young woman as the victim. The reality is different.

The abused individual could be a wealthy neighbor, a quiet husband, a celebrity or a toddler.

Las Vegas Metro Police responding to almost 60,000 calls in 2017 from persons who were assaulted by someone inside their household.

The true figure is apt to be higher as many victims are too scared or ashamed to admit they need help. For nine of the past ten-years, Nevada has ranked in the top 10 states. The Clark County District Attorney's Office receives, on average, 15 new cases each day.

Safe Nest

Safe Nest, a Henderson based shelter and resource center for sexual assault and domestic violence victims and perpetrators runs 13 intervention programs in the state. Most participants are court-ordered to attend, once they're released from jail.

During each class, staff pays attention to how abusers react to discussions, but also how they interact and what they say to each other when they believe counselors aren't watching.

"If we see an attitude change to the positive, we say we have a good chance of rehabilitation," said Dennis Henson, a therapist with Safe House.
